Icebreaker

What are some things that you have been feeling/experiencing during this time of racial unrest?

Spend some time **PRAYING** for our country, our leaders, the black community, and George Floyd's family.

RUTH 2:1-23

The narrator calls Ruth a Moabite several times, reminding the reader of her past. Shame does the same thing in our lives. **What are some things that shame tells us that we are?**

Boaz speaks to Ruth differently. What does the Gospel say about our identity?

Verse 20

'Kindness' (hesed) here means covenant love or loving-kindness. What is the significance of a covenant in the Old Testament?

'Redeemer' (*goel*) means kinsman redeemer. This refers back to laws in Leviticus and Deuteronomy. If a member of your family got sold into slavery, it was the kinsman redeemer's responsibility to buy that person out of slavery. To redeem them. If a member of your family was treated unjustly, it was the kinsman redeemer's responsibility to exact justice for that family member.

How does this story of a 'kinsman redeemer' speak into our lives?

Boaz is a godly man. He is a man of generous grace, courageous strength, and tender inclusion. How does masculinity, both biblical and toxic, impact people, culture, etc.?

Ruth's hope is not in Biblical masculinity. What is Ruth's hope in?

Reflection: (MEN) Where do you need to extend generous grace this week? Where do you need to live out of courageous strength this week? Where do you need to be a man of tender inclusion this week?

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Have a time of **sharing**. (i.e. Share highs/lows in this season, needs in your home/community, etc.)
